OGDEN—William Henderson Dickson, a pioneer of Morgan county, died Sunday of injuries suffered when he was struck by an automobile seven weeks ago.

Mr. Dickson received a broken leg and shock when an automobile backed into him after a basketball game in Morgan, Feb. 15. He was not believed seriously injured.

Physicians at the Ogden hospital, where he was taken several days ago, attributed death to shock from the accident. Sheriff Thomas W. Fry of Morgan county said Sunday night an investigation will be started to determine the driver of the car and place the blame of the accident.

Mr. Dickson, a farmer and stockraiser of the Richville district, was born March 22, 1850, in Iowa, son of William and Mary Ann Dickson. He came to Morgan county at an early age with his family.

He served in Richville ward bishopric 25 years, and was superintendent of the Sunday school 17 years prior to that. He was Morgan county road supervisor many years. From 1898 to 1900 he served in the Nebraska mission field. His wife died several years ago.
